THIS ENTIRE APPENDIX IS GUIDANCE

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Section 1: Overview

- <u>A.</u> The Division of Vocational Rehabilitation (DVR) may not place an absolute dollar limit on specific service categories or total services provided. However, DVR may set spending guidelines to ensure reasonable costs to the program. The guidelines may not be so low as to deny a consumer a necessary service.
- A.<u>B.</u> The following appendix is intended to be a reference guide for Division of Vocational Rehabilitation (DVR)-<u>DVR</u> consumers and DVR staff on the spending guidelines for any particular service. All DVR spending guidelines are considered guidance. When reviewing the guidelines, it is recommended DVR staff and consumers remember:
 - The spending guidelines are not absolute minimums or maximums. All VR services are based on the individualized needs of the consumer, the specific employment goal of the consumer and what other resources are available to the consumer. DVR may pay more or less than the guideline depending on the individual circumstances. In some cases, DVR will not contribute any funds to a service if the consumer has access to other resources or comparable benefits to pay for a service.
 - DVR consumers and staff should reference the specific policy manual chapter to find out under what circumstances DVR will pay for a service. Except under extraordinary circumstances, DVR will only pay for services if those services will lead towards the eventual achievement of an employment goal. The specific policy chapter will also provide information regarding under what circumstances DVR will make exceptions from the spending guidelines.
- C. 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<u>D. DVR cannot require consumers who are SSI or SSDI beneficiaries to</u> provide funding towards their services, including post-secondary services, and training. DVR cannot require consumers to obtain a student loan to provide funding for post-secondary education and training. These consumers are still required to apply for financial assistance outlined in policy.
